

#### IN MEMORIAM: ELIZABETH "BETTY" ANDERSON BY THE ANDERSON FAMILY



Former CLC Potomac Region member Betty Anderson of Gambrills, MD passed away on May 30, 2024, at age 80. She met retiring CLC Chief Judge William "Bill" Anderson at Iowa State University, and they were married on November 12, 1966. Following graduation in May 1967, they moved to upstate New York. Ultimately settling in Auburn, Betty worked for Cayuga County Social Services and supported Bill's engineering career. William C. Anderson, III was born in September 1970 and Erica D. Anderson arrived in February 1972 in the midst of a major snowstorm.

A change in Bill's career led them to move to the Annapolis, MD area in 1985, and Betty's career with Maryland state government was launched. She served for 20 years as Special Assistant/Office Manager of the Maryland Governor's Legislative Office during four different gubernatorial administrations: Parris N. Glendening, Robert L. Ehrlich,

Jr., Martin J. O'Malley, and Lawrence J. Hogan, Jr.

The breadth of her duties went far beyond what the outside world and even many of her colleagues could see. Joseph C. Bryce, former Chief Legislative Officer remarked: "Betty was a very special person. For the 11 years we worked together, she was my partner, protector, confidante, and guiding light. She was smart, caring and always worked until the job was done." Governor Glendening, the first Governor for whom she worked, echoed that sentiment: "Betty was the engine that made our Legislative Office run. She was a true professional and a wonderful person who had the respect of her colleagues and elected officials. I feel honored to have worked with her for so many years."

Although Betty retired from State government after the 2016 legislative session, she worked an additional three legislative sessions in the legislative office of Johns Hopkins University before settling into retirement completely.



# MY FIRST GRAND NATIONAL (AS A SPECTATOR) BY MORGAN YEH



The 2024 Grand National at Gettysburg, PA, was absolutely drivable for us. Unfortunately, the children's last week of school ran through the week of the Grand National. We all know about kids and their love of elementary school parties and games, so there was no skipping out on the most fun days in school. Our only option was to drive bright and early on Saturday morning, the last day of the event, from Chantilly, VA and join in as spectators.

It was sunny and beautiful, with a slight breeze and not yet too hot. We got there just as folks were waking up and going out and about at the Wyndham Hotel. Idling by the side of the road before entering into the hotel lot, I was starting to put on some hip-hop music for the kids in our 1992 Brougham d'Elegance (because you have to make an entrance when going to the Grand National...it's the Grand National!), when Vince Taliano pulled right up next to me from behind in his black 1965 Sedan deVille. #352 - A DREAM COME TRUE - PART IV:
WHAT THE JUDGES DIDN'T SEE

This is the conclusion of a series by Larry Good on the restoration of his '53 Eldorado. See the Caddie Chronicle, <u>Jan. 2020</u>, <u>Aug. 2020</u> and <u>Jun. 2022</u> issues for the first three parts.

After nearly six years, Eldorado #352 finally got restored enough to push it into the Washington Auto Show last January and to drive it onto the Grand National show field this June. It went through a series of misfortunes after returning to the States, but love triumphs over all. In this case love means money. I used to try to save \$100 here and there. Then it became \$10,000 here and there. It ended up \$100,000 here and there. I'm writing this from a jail cell... went straight to debtor's prison without passing Go.

Nonsense aside, let's dwell on what's good about #352. My goal was to recreate 1953 accurately with this machine, and it came close, very close. At the CLC Grand National in June it tied for 1st in Class 14 with Jim Govoni's exquisite 1953 Series 62 sedan.

The title of this article is not about deceiving the judges in Gettysburg. Rather, it refers to good things that were out of sight or not obvious to the casual observer. Writing articles is the only way to showcase them.






Here are a few examples.

#### **Power Steering Hoses**

The CLC Class 14 Authenticity Manual even tells us that the hydraulic hoses between the power steering pump and servo are a bit strange. The ones a vendor sent to the restoration shop were wrong, so we had hoses fabricated from scratch with the right diameters and fittings. We tinted the metal ends, worked the surface of the rubber to remove lettering and get the correct geometry, and finally put hose bands over the metal couplings as the factory did to prevent banging and scratching the engine compartment. The manual says that only the high pressure hose has a metal coupling mid-length, but a factory drawing shows couplings in both hoses. We went with the factory.

#### **Exhaust Clamps**





Most exhaust clamps and hangers are only visible by putting the car up on a lift. Very many antique cars today use the modern U-style clamps that weren't invented yet in 1953. My own 1947 Cadillac has them. (Shame!) The picture (left) of the complex arrangement on Eldorado #352 shows what `53 Cadillacs actually used. These parts had to be scavenged and restored. They even have the right bolts now.

Very special hangers in 1953 were the ones that came sideways out of the end of the frame to hold the back of each tailpipe. At the outside end of each hanger there is a rather large square sheet of rubber that blocks wind where each pipe enters its port-

hole in the rear bumper. I can't figure out the reason for this design. The Cadillac Master Parts List doesn't even show it, but all original 1953 Cadillacs, including my parts car, had it. I was lucky to find an NOS pair for restoration from Bob Mooney.

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#### **Exhaust Wrap**



For a couple of years, I puzzled over how to wrap the exhaust header pipes. The Master Parts List diagram shows something on the headers but doesn't say what. The CLC Class 14 Authenticity Manual calls for a spiral steel wrap there, but other restorers said it was asbestos, not metal. Finally, this year I found original examples. Aaron Cole of Cole's Classics has a Coupe deVille junker with some of its asbestos still in place. Aaron lent me an aluminum strap for replication. Then Eldorado #287 appeared for sale on the internet with a picture (left) of all its asbestos wrap from beginning to end on both sides still in place, even with the same straps. Bingo! Using faux asbestos from McVey's and fabricated straps, that's the wrap #352 got. Maybe someday the Authenticity Manual can be updated.

#### **AOS Stencil**

Even if the judges bent way over and looked straight at it, they wouldn't notice the AO Smith stencil on the frame because it's not required for CLC judging. The club has never paid much attention to the frame manufacturer. Back in the July 2021 issue of the *Caddie Chronicle* I wrote an article about the AOS branding, and now it's on my car (pictured right). For a pattern I copied the only picture of an original 1953 example I ever saw that on Eldorado #145. My wife Maia bought a cutting machine to create the stencil. She and our son Paul used magic software to get the font exactly right (letter height: 39/64"). I chose a date four weeks before assembly at Clark Avenue. Lacking Cadillac records, I used to think the time window for frame manufacture was strictly two to nine weeks before assembly because that's how



Corvettes were. Recently, however, Cadillac restorer Quentin Hall found another original 1953 example dated ten weeks before assembly. The window has expanded.





#### **Dash Knobs**

Eight of the 1953 Cadillac's dash knobs came from the factory with a brushed outer circle and a smooth polished center. The American plater said the brushed surfaces could not be restored, so he polished them smooth... then sent me a bill! I couldn't live with the ruined knobs. No good shop in America would fix them with less than a year's wait. So, I shipped a spare set express to Armenia where Ashot Avagyan made them right in no time and got them back to me in 30 days, still in time for the Grand National.

#### **Stainless Trim**

Over the years, moving from shop to shop, some unique items got "lost." (They must be making somebody else happy.) One of these was the Eldorado-only stainless trim that goes on




top of the passenger's door. It's a complicated geometry that wraps around the lock button. No others existed for purchase anywhere. Money couldn't buy it. In a panic, I prevailed upon the one person I knew who could fabricate it: Quentin Hall in Australia. Quentin restores these cars and fabricates everything necessary. Without even agreeing on a price, he made the part overnight in time for the Washington Auto Show. In return, I sent him a CARE package of Eldorado items he needed. We exchanged equally invaluable parts. As with the dash knobs, the judges looked right at the trim part but couldn't see the back story.





#### Stone Fuel Filter





There's nothing secret about the fuel filter. It's only hiding in plain sight because most people don't pay attention to it. Looking into glass bowls these days, you'll usually see a bellows-shaped

paper filter element. In 1953, however, the element was a porous stone. You had to wash it and put it back in every now and then. We saved an original stone element and used it in the restoration (adjacent pictures). I wonder how many spectators were awed.

#### **Electro-Vac Label**

Only Eldorados had electrically driven Trico vacuum pumps, called Electro-Vac, as factory issued equipment in 1953. The pump boosted vacuum above what the fuel pump and intake manifold could provide in order to force the wipers around the corners of the Eldorado's "panoramic" windshield. Trico stuck its label on the pump. The label couldn't even survive 70 years of shelf life, let alone the hostile engine bay environment. They have to be replaced, but the only commercially available repro labels show a patent date of 1954, too new for a 1953 car. So, I had to make my own with a correct patent date of 1936. The label is so inaccessible that nobody can read it. People asked me, "Why did

you bother?" Well, it was just the right thing to do.
